

#### INTRODUCTION

The goal of this report is to provide information about the distribution of educational attainment of people working in the District of Columbia by occupation. The information is presented in four tables. Table 1 and Table 2 show data on educational attainment by *detailed occupation* for 2010-2011 and 2005-2009, respectively. Table 3 and Table 4 present more aggregate data on educational attainment by *major occupational group* for the same two time periods. The source of all data is taken from the American Community Survey (ACS) micro files. The ACS is an annual statistical survey conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. <sup>2</sup>

#### **DEFINITIONS AND CONCEPTS**

All Tables have a very similar organizational structure and include the following columns:

**ACS SOC** – The ACS version of the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) code for a given occupation. Detailed occupations in Table 1 and Table 2 are typically described by full six-digit SOC codes, while major occupational groups in Table 3 and Table 4 are described by the first two digits of the full code followed by four zeros. By definition, major occupational groups bring together related detailed occupations.<sup>3</sup>

**ACS SOC Occupational Title** – Occupation titles for *detailed occupations* in Table 1 and Table 2, and occupation titles for *major occupational group* in Table 3 and Table 4 associated with the ACS SOC code.

**Survey Observations** – The total number of ACS survey observations used to produce the estimates for a given occupation. These numbers are the two-year totals for 2010-2011 in Table 1 and Table 3 and the five-year totals for 2005-2009 in Table 2 and Table 4.

**Employment** – The estimated number of people working in a given occupation in the District of Columbia. These numbers are the two-year averages for 2010-2011 in Table 1 and Table 3 and the five-year averages for 2005-2009 in Table 2 and Table 4.

In particular, detailed occupations with ACS SOC codes that end in X or zero usually combine several detailed occupations defined by the BLS.

**Educational Attainment** – The estimated number of people in a given occupation, as a percentage of all people working in that occupation in the District of Columbia, that attained each of the following levels of education:

- 1) Less than high school diploma
- 2) High school diploma or equivalent
- 3) Less than one year of college, no degree
- 4) One or more years of college, no degree
- 5) Associate's degree
- 6) Bachelor's degree
- 7) Master's degree
- 8) Professional degree
- 9) Doctoral degree

It should be emphasized that the percentages shown in the nine educational-attainment columns count workers according to *the highest level of education* that they attained. Therefore, these percentages total 100 percent for each occupation (subject to rounding). To calculate the sum total of the percent of workers in a particular occupation that attained *at least a certain level of education*, add the percentages for the particular level of education attained and the higher levels of education. For example, the percent of workers that attained at a least a bachelor's degree can be computed by adding together the percent of workers with a bachelor's degree, a master's degree, a professional degree, and a doctoral degree.

Please note that the percentages shown in the nine educational-attainment columns represent statistical estimates derived from the ACS survey sample. The reliability of these estimates for a particular occupation depends on the number of survey observations for that occupation. And for some occupations (especially for some detailed occupations in Table 1 and Table 2), this number can be small. Therefore, when using the data presented in this report, look at the number shown in the *Survey Observations* column to search a specific occupation of interest. And, if this number is smaller than 10 (or smaller than 20 to be more conservative), the educational-attainment estimates should be used with caution.

For most occupations, the 2005-2009 estimates in Table 2 and Table 4 are based on a larger number of survey observations and, hence, tend to be statistically more reliable than the more recent 2010-2011 estimates in Table 1 and Table 3. This is because the former estimates use five years of data, while the latter estimates use only two years of data. In any case, one should always compare the 2005-2009 and the 2010-2011 estimates for a specific occupation of interest and verify that the patterns of educational attainment in the two periods are broadly consistent.<sup>4</sup>

#### POSSIBLE USES OF DATA ON EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT BY OCCUPATION

This section provides some examples on how the information provided in this report can be used by job seekers, employers, and training providers. These examples are meant to be illustrative rather than exhaustive. In all the examples, it is assumed that the workers in question have average work experience and talent so that their level of education is (or should be) the primary determinant of their career choice and work productivity.<sup>5</sup>

#### Example 1

Michael lives in the District of Columbia and does not have a high school diploma. He is currently unemployed and is looking to work as a bartender in one of the District's bars.

Table 1 and Table 2 indicate that less than 5 percent of all bartenders (ACS SOC = 353011) working in the District of Columbia lack a high school diploma. This suggests that Michael's chances of finding a job as a bartender may be slim. Michael may want to reconsider his career choice, at least until he earns a high school diploma (or equivalent).

#### Example 2

Rebecca lives in the District of Columbia. She has a high school diploma but has never attended college. Rebecca is looking to work as a secretary or administrative assistant and has recently received several job offers with a pay of \$19 per hour. However, Rebecca decided to decline all of these offers because she wants to be paid at least \$24 per hour, which she knows is the average and the median wage for secretaries and administrative assistants working in the District.<sup>6</sup>

Table 1 and Table 2 show that only between 21 and 28 percent of all secretaries and administrative assistants (ACS SOC = 436010) working in the District of Columbia have a high school diploma or less, while the remaining 72 to 79 percent have more education. Therefore, it may not be surprising that Rebecca is offered a lower-than-average hourly pay. In fact, \$19 per hour is close to the 25<sup>th</sup> percentile of the distribution of wages for secretaries and administrative assistants working in the District. Thus, given Rebecca's level of education, the wage that she was offered seems to be quite fair. Rebecca may want to reconsider her earlier decision and accept one of the job offers that she declined.

Half of the workers in a given occupation earn more than the median wage and half of the workers earn less than the median wage.

#### Example 3

Supply & Demand is an economic think tank located in the District. Most economists working in Supply & Demand have bachelor's degrees. The president of Supply & Demand is concerned that the analytical publications produced by Supply & Demand are of lower quality than those produced by other think tanks in the District.

Table 1 and Table 2 show that approximately 85 percent of all economists (ACS SOC = 193011) working in the District of Columbia have more than a bachelor's degree. In fact, about 40 percent of the District's economists have doctoral degrees and another 40 percent have master's degrees. This suggests that the relatively low quality of Supply & Demand's publications may be a result of the insufficient level of education of its economists. Therefore, to correct the problem, the president of Supply & Demand should consider hiring several master- or PhD-level economists.

#### Example 4

Happy Toddler is a childcare center in the District of Columbia. To sustain the high quality of services that it provides, Happy Toddler has a policy of only hiring childcare workers that have bachelor's degrees. Happy Toddler pays all of its childcare workers \$14 per hour, which is the average and the median wage earned by childcare workers in the District. The owner of Happy Toddler is concerned about the high rate of turnover among the center's childcare workers, many of whom quit only several months after being hired.

Table 1 and Table 2 show that only between 18 percent (in 2005-2009) and 31 percent (in 2010-2011) of childcare workers (ACS SOC = 399011) in the District of Columbia have a bachelor's degree (or above). Therefore, it may not be surprising that Happy Toddler struggles to retain its well-educated employees by paying them the District's average (and median) wage for childcare workers. To solve the high-turnover problem, the owner of Happy Toddler should consider raising the wage of its childcare workers at least to the 75<sup>th</sup> percentile of the distribution of wages for childcare workers in the District, which happens to be around \$17.50 per hour.<sup>8</sup>

#### Example 5

Learn & Work is an educational institution that provides occupational training to District residents. The president of Learn & Work would like to open a new associate degree program to prepare workers in one of two occupations: logisticians (ACS SOC= 131081) or operations research analysts (ACS SOC = 152031). Both occupations pay relatively high (and similar) wages and are projected to have faster-than-average growth in the next 10 years. So which program should the president select?

Table 1 and Table 2 indicate that only about 15 percent of all operations research analysts working in the District of Columbia have less than a bachelor's degree (and only about 2 percent of them have an associate degree). In contrast, as many as 34 percent of all logisticians working in the District have less than a bachelor's degree (and 6 to 7 percent of them have an associate's degree). This suggests that the graduates of Learn & Work will have better chances of finding a job with an associate's degree in logistics than with an associate's degree in operations research analysis. Therefore, the president of Learn & Work should probably choose the former type of program over the latter.

#### **CONCLUSION**

**Educational Attainment of People Working in the District of Columbia** presents data on educational attainment of people working in the District of Columbia by detailed occupation and by major occupational group from the years 2010-2011 and 2005-2009. The report describes the organizational structure of the data tables and provides some guidance and examples on how to interpret the data. In addition, the report illustrates how the information provided can be used by job seekers, employers, and training providers.
